Tongan Language Week

The 2024 theme for Tonga Language Week is:

'E tu'uloa 'a e lea faka-Tongá 'o ka lea'aki 'i 'api, siasí (lotú), mo e nofo-'a-kāingá - The Tongan Language will be sustainable when used at home, church and in the wider community.

This theme derives from the overarching Language Week Series theme for 2024, 'Sustainability'. Good Shepherd School is especially lucky to have such a diverse, unique and talented community - which appreciates and celebrates our diversity. For many of our whānau, English is not their first language. It is essential that the languages of home are preserved, fostered and nurtured so they remain. We thank our Tongan children and their families for sharing their expertise in this rich culture with us over the week.



Yesterday our GSS student Maggie and her older sister Ysabella Nimo represented their tongan culture by performina at the ASB Pasefika Network Group. Tonga Language week Expo and Pop-Up Market yesterday at their head office in the city.

Ysabella and Maggie's Nana, Seini, was invited to showcase and talk about her handmade crafts while the

girls were invited to perform a traditional Tongan

dance to open the Expo. Maggie also assisted at the 'How well do you know your Tongan' stall' where she tested ASB on their Tongan language skills by getting them to match Tongan phrases to the English equivalent.

Tomorrow Friday 23 August we invite our tongan families to dress in their traditional tongan attire to school.

We are looking forward to Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori in Week 9 of this term.



In Room 7, we've been diving into the fascinating world of ecosystems as part of our inquiry topic. The students have explored various types of ecosystems through research and discussions. To bring our learning to life, we conducted an observational experiment where each student created their own mini-ecosystem in a mason jar. This hands-on activity allowed the students to see how different elements in an ecosystem interact and depend on each other. It's been an exciting and educational experience, and we're eager to continue our exploration of the natural world!

Sustainability Learning at GSS

Following on from our interactive learning experience with the Tread Lightly Caravan in June, over Term 3 and 4, each class will be a part of four sustainability focussed sessions with Ms Chan. The key messages from the Tread Lightly Caravan were:

- Our actions and choices have an impact on our environment.
- The current rate and way in which we use resources (water, materials, energy) is not sustainable
- Small changes in the way we live will prevent pollution and protect our plants, animals and their habitats

Each class has had one sustainability session with Ms Chan so far. These have been based on some follow up activities from the Tread Lightly Educators, focusing on students learning about reducing their waste and having good recycling practices. We have taken this learning and thought about how we can do a better job of reducing waste and having good recycling practices at Good Shepherd School. Key Ideas included:

- Looking after our classroom resources so that they do not become damaged and need to go into landfill
- Using only what we need (eg limit use of paper towels and tissues to essential use)
- Bringing a waste free lunch to school
- Ensuring nothing goes into the landfill bin which could actually be recycled
- Ensuring nothing goes into the landfill bin which could go into the worm farm compost bins
- Ensuring any bottles/cans/containers/boxes have been cleaned before being put into the recycling bin

 Ensuring recycling is not contaminated with non recyclable items



Home-School Connection

If you are keen to reinforce this learning in the home, you could try playing this game at home with your child. They have done this in class already so you can test them on their knowledge or they can test you! Recycle Right Game. In addition to this, if you do not already collect soft plastics at home and take them to the soft plastics recycling bin at the supermarket, this is something you may like to start doing with your child. This was something that was discussed at Tread Lightly to reduce landfill waste. We do not collect soft plastics at Good Shepherd because we ask that students' lunches are waste free.

Waste Free Lunches

We encourage you to continue with sending a waste free lunch to school with your child. This can be achieved by using a compartment lunchbox or reusable containers inside a lunchbox/lunch bag and removing any packaging from food items before placing it in the lunchbox. We ask children who do have any waste in their lunchbox (packaging or uneaten food) to bring it home to put into their home food waste / soft plastic recycling where possible unless we can accommodate it in our school worm farms or recycling bins

School Trip to Maritime Museum

Immigration and Identity PROGRAMME OVERVIEW

Why do people migrate? What are the driving forces that influence people to leave?

Experience the journeys of immigrants from the past and get your sea legs in the 1841 rocking cabin. Beginning with the story of our first people, this Educator-led workshop will lead you on a journey through time to today's migrants. Together we will discover how people migrate and most importantly why. Students will reflect on their own whanau origins, their reasons for migrating, and their impact on the changing face of Aotearoa New Zealand. The workshop is complemented by a self-guided immigration trail that explores the Museum's taonga including Te Waka, an animated short film showing the Pacific migration of the early Polynesians. Students will work in small groups, led by their adult supervisors, to follow their own interests and learn at their own pace. **Students will also get to go sailing on a sailing ship with the instructors.**


School Uniform



If you have ordered a Moosie from Kindo, please remind your child they MUST line up outside Room 2 at lunchtime, after they are released from sitting/eating time. Moosie monitors are not able to find children once lunch begins.
